The Enforcement Report dated 23 February 2024 concluded that Trade Wind took all the necessary steps to address the impact of the oil spill and has eliminated any further threat to the environment from the facility.

A few dead and dying shrimp were seen along the Rio Cobre banks, downstream of impacted drain. Site Warning Notice # 017326 served. Status of clean-up Oil containment booms were installed across the Rio Cobre
Follow-up visit	14 December 2023	 Clean-up activities monitored. No further impact on wildlife observed. Status of clean-up Oil discharge ceased

Legal standing of the Friends of the Rio Cobre		 Research to date reveals that the current Friendly Society website does not list the company.¹ No evidence that they have any legal standing as a fiat was presented in court.
